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Report to the Veteran Community on the 82nd Legislative Session

Fulfilling the Requirements of Assembly Bill 62 (2015)
Provided by the Director of the Nevada Department of Veterans Services

September 1, 2023

- 1. Introduction: This memorandum provides a report to the veteran community as required by NRS 417.103. This report is intended to provide information regarding veterans' legislation to the veteran community, and, over time, to establish a history of legislation introduced, passed, or considered that can be referenced in future policy discussions. NRS 417.103 requires the Director of the Nevada Department of Veterans Services (NDVS) to provide this report no later than September 1 following each regular session of the Legislature, and requires that the report provide details on the following:
- A description of each newly enacted statute by the Legislature affecting veterans in this State.
- A description of each bill, or portion of a bill, newly enacted by the Legislature that appropriates
 or authorizes money for veterans, or otherwise affects the amount of money that is available for
 veterans' services, including, without limitation, each line item in a budget for such an
 appropriation or authorization.
- A brief plan by the Director, NDVS for carrying out duties required by newly passed legislation.
- The date on which each statute and bill described in the memorandum becomes effective.

2. Background:

- a. For decades, NDVS has coordinated the efforts of Nevada's veterans' community events by convening legislative meetings and councils to: (1) gather issues important to veterans that could be considered for a legislative bill draft request (BDR), and (2) educate veterans, their families, and their supporters so they might fully participate in the legislative process. The three events traditionally conducted are the Veterans Legislative Symposium, the Veterans Legislative Summit, and Veterans and Military Day at the Legislature.
- b. During the 77th Legislative Session (2013), Nevada's veterans organizations formed an informal coalition (later organized as the United Veterans Legislative Council or UVLC) to help create a single voice, where possible, to advocate for veterans' legislation. During the 78th Legislative Session, NDVS first partnered with the UVLC to conduct the Veterans Legislative Symposium, the Veterans Legislative Summit, and Veterans and Military Day at the Legislature.
- c. This partnership continued through later Legislative Sessions, resulting in a greater appreciation of issues affecting Nevada veterans, active duty, guard, and reserve serving in Nevada, and their family members. During the 82nd Legislative Session the UVLC Chair was Andy LePeilbet (Military

Order of the Purple Heart) and UVLC senior representatives; Secretary Peggy Bohn (Lady Vets), Vice Chair Ms. Bobi Oates, (Women Veterans of Nevada), Mr. Bruno Moya (Merging Vets and Players), Jim Kelly (VFW), and Norman Allen (Marine Corps League/VVA).

3. 82nd Legislative Session Events:

- a. Legislative Symposia: March 19, 2022 (Las Vegas), March 26, 2022 (Reno).
- (1) During the past four sessions, symposia have been held in both northern and southern Nevada except for 2020, when due to the global pandemic, a single symposium was held virtually.
- (2) Recommendations gathered from six Nevada's veterans' panels, committees, and commission, and from State of Nevada Veterans Services Organizations, were presented to Symposium participants. Participants included leaders of all of Nevada's major Veterans Service Organizations, individual veterans and their supporters.
- (3) During the Symposium final recommendations and prioritizations were gathered and compiled into a report for consideration by Nevada's elected officials. 61 recommendations were identified, and 11 of these recommendations were prioritized as being the most critical. 14 of the 61 were Federal issues and were referred to Nevada's Federal Delegation for consideration.
- (4) There were several common themes that emerged from the recommendations. These themes, in priority order, were:
- **STATE-WIDE THEME 1:** Improve medical and mental health care programs.
- **STATE-WIDE THEME 2:** Require service providers to implement the, "Ask the Question" Program.
- **STATE-WIDE THEME 3:** Reduce certain state fees, offering veterans preferences, and providing medical time off for veterans employed by the State of Nevada.
- **STATE-WIDE THEME 4:** Occupational licensure for veterans and military spouses.
- **STATE-WIDE THEME 5:** Programing for veterans in/transitioning from justice system.
 - b. 82nd Legislative Summits: January 14, 2023 (Las Vegas), January 21, 2023 (Reno).
- (1) The purpose of the summits was to provide an update on the status of the prioritized legislative recommendations developed during the Symposia, a description of bills that had been pre-filed with the Legislative Counsel Bureau, and information about how veterans and veteran supporters could participate in the legislative process.
- (2) At the Reno summit, there were 78 attendees with 67 attending the Las Vegas summit. These attendees represented 17 different veterans' organizations.
- c. Veterans and Military Day at the Legislature (VAMDAL). Carson City Capitol and Legislative Complexes: March 15, 2023.
- (1) Veterans Day at the Legislature. The third Wednesday in March during each regular session of the Legislature is established as "Veterans Day at the Legislature" in the State of Nevada in

recognition of the contributions veterans have made to the prosperity of Nevada and the United States (NRS 236.047).

(2) Historically, VAMDAL is jointly hosted by NDVS, the UVLC, and the Nevada National Guard and provides an opportunity for veterans to talk directly to legislators on legislation important to them and to see a display of Nevada National Guard equipment. Due to weather conditions, this event was moved inside the State Library and Archives building. Approximately 300 veterans, military and supporters attended this event. Following the ceremony, veteran attendees were given the opportunity to join their legislators on the floors of the Senate and Assembly to be recognized. This was followed by the opportunity to meet with providers, exhibitors, and enjoy a catered lunch.

4. 82nd Legislative Session Bill Overview

- a. 29 bill draft requests (BDRs) supporting veterans, military, and their families were assigned a bill. 18 important Veterans bills were signed into law by Governor Lombardo and one Senate Joint Resolution was enrolled and sent to the Secretary of State, comprising 66 percent of bills considered favorably. 10 bills failed by the Legislative deadline.
- b. Four of the five state-wide themes identified in the 2022 Legislative Symposia were addressed through 18 bills that the Governor signed, or through the passage of Governor Lombardo's SFY 24-25 Budget as shown here. Details of each of the bills shown below are in Paragraph 5 and 6 of this report:

THEME 1: Improve medical and mental health care programs: AB 7, AB 108, AB311, AJR 1, SB 178, SB 218, SB 298.

THEME 2: Require service providers to implement the, "Ask the Question" Program: No BDRs.

THEME 3: Honor and recognize veterans' service by reducing certain state fees, offering veterans preferences, and providing medical time off for veterans employed by the State of Nevada: AB 203, AB 260, AB 279, AB 295, AB 306, SB 50, SB 374.

THEME 4: Improve occupational licensure for veterans and military spouses: AB 158, SB 97, SB 175, SB 270, SB 399, SB 442.

THEME 5: Improve programing for veterans in/transitioning from justice system: AB 35.

Additionally, funding was approved in the Governor's CIP Budget to remodel the Southern Nevada State Veterans Home, for planning the North Las Vegas State Veterans Home, and for other projects.

Based on the Governor's budget requests, the Legislature approved two full-time Grounds Maintenance Workers, two full-time Veteran Service Officers, two Health Program Specialists (one Veterans Suicide Prevention Program Manager and one Healthcare Initiative Program Manager), one Education/Employment Program Manager and a Northern Nevada Outreach Director.

Additionally, the Governor's recommended budget was approved with funding for the Adopt a Vet Dental Program, the number one priority from the attendees of the NDVS/UVLC Legislative Symposia held in March 2022.

5. Detailed Description of Legislation Considered and Passed: The following section provides a description of veteran-related legislation that passed, the date each statute and bill described in the memorandum becomes effective, and a brief plan by the NDVS Director for carrying out duties required by newly passed legislation. Additionally, this section also lists bills that failed by deadline or by the Governor's veto as reference for future policy discussions on veterans' issues.

✓ AB 7: Revises provisions relating to electronic health records. (BDR 40-381)

Sponsor(s): Introduced by the Assembly Committee on Health and Human Services

Votes: Passed Assembly with 28 Yeas, 14 Nays, Senate 14 Yeas, 7 Nays

Effective Date: Section 4 and sections 1.09, 1.1, and 1.2 effective June 10, 2023. Sections 2.5 and 2.7 effective on July 1, 2023. Sections 1 to 1.08, inclusive, 1.3 to 2.45, inclusive, 2.8, and 3 effective on June 10, 2023, for the purpose of adopting any regulations and performing any other preparatory administrative tasks that are necessary to carry out the provisions of this act, and on July 1, 2024, for all other purposes.

Status: Signed into law by the Governor

NDVS Director's Plan for Implementation: Department of Health and Human Services is the lead for this action.

✓ AB 35: Revises provisions governing the access of offenders to telecommunications devices.
(BDR 16-261)

NDVS Director's Plan for Implementation: Department of Corrections is the lead for this action.

Effective Date: July 1, 2023.

NDVS Director's Plan for Implementation: NDVS has worked with the Governor's office to notify the three agencies that they have been selected to participate on the ICVA.

✓ AB 44: Authorize NDVS to revise the titles of Deputy Directors and provide training to Accredited Veterans Service Officers. (BDR 37-243)

Effective Date: July 1, 2023.

NDVS Director's Plan for Implementation: NDVS has implemented the change in the Deputy Directors' titles. NDVS will coordinate with all accredited Veterans Service Organizations to offer training for their accredited Veterans Service Officers.
