- SNSVH maintained the highest 5-Star Quality Rating.
- NV Advocate program issued its 1,000th certificate.
- Record setting number of volunteers and wreaths laid during Wreaths Across America.
- New partnerships involving tribal communities for veterans' healthcare initiatives to prevent suicide and raise awareness about toxic exposure risks.

There are too many accomplishments this year to list here. That is why I encourage you to read through this report. It demonstrates the passion and commitment of each and every one of us at NDVS to make sure Nevada's veterans, U.S. Armed Forces, and their families are connected to the benefits, resources, and programs they have earned!

We are grateful to have such strong support from Nevada's lawmakers.

I encourage you to take the time to review this Annual Report. You will learn what NDVS and the State of Nevada have to offer our veterans and their families. You will also find that we take our job seriously in making sure Nevada's veterans are afforded the respect, dignity, and consideration they deserve for their service and sacrifice to our country. 

NDVS 80th Anniversary Celebration

NDVS hosted an 80th Anniversary Celebration at the Governor's mansion on August 29, 2023. Guests included the Governor, Lt. Governor, and other state and regional VIPs.

2

VAST Team Sets New Monetary Award Record

The Veterans Advocacy Support Team (VAST) generated veteran disability benefits in the amount of \$275,178,477 for SFY 23. The VAST team submitted 3,267 claims to the VA in SFY 2023.

3

Veterans and Military Day at the Legislature (VAMDAL)

Seating was at capacity for VAMDAL, which was held in Carson City on March 15, 2023, to provide opportunities for veterans, military, and dependents to interact with their legislators. The event featured key State of Nevada lawmakers including Governor Lombardo who served as the featured speaker. Thank you to our Nevada National Guard partners and the 37 exhibitors who participated.

Nevada Veterans Legislative Summit

NDVS hosted the Nevada Veterans Legislative Summit in Las Vegas on March 19, 2023, and in Reno on March 26, 2023, to allow veterans, military, and spouses to receive information on the priorities for the next legislative session.

SNVMC and NNVMC Expansions

Expansion projects at both state veterans' cemeteries were completed in 2023. In November 2023, the NNVMC Columbarium Project provided 3,580 wall niche sites, 806 double casket sites, and 757 in-ground cremation sites. With this expansion, 11 years of utilization have been added. The SNVMC provided 5,432 in-ground cremation sites and 5,740 wall niche sites. With this expansion, 8 years of utilization have been added.

NDVS Hosts Record Breaking Wreaths Across America Event

On December 16, 2023, the Nevada State Veteran Memorial Cemeteries hosted Wreaths Across America. The SNVMC had approximately 3,000 people in attendance, the largest attendance on record. The number of wreaths laid also set a record with 12,528 wreaths laid by volunteers. The NNVMC had 2,300 attendees who placed 8,000 wreaths on each gravesite. The events were hosted by NDVS and were sponsored by the Nevada Veterans Coalition in Fernley and Civil Air Patrol in Boulder City.

7

SNSVH Maintains Highest 5-Star Quality Rating

SNSVH had two major surveys in January and February from the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). SNSVH retained its 5-Star CMS Quality Care Rating, the highest rating possible. Only 10% of skilled nursing facilities in the nation achieve a 5-Star rating.

Crombie Academy Certified Nursing Assistant Academy Training Program

A pinning ceremony for six Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) graduates occurred on February 2, 2023. The PFC Nick Crombie CNA Training Academy is an NDVS workforce development program that provides FREE training to participants who gain basic CNA knowledge, along with an understanding of how military culture affects the care of veterans and their families. Upon graduation, there are potential CNA job opportunities at the SNSVH for those who go on to receive their State of Nevada CNA certification.

SNSVH celebrated its 21st Anniversary in August 2023, by hosting its annual open house celebration in conjunction with the Boulder City Chamber of Commerce mixer.

NDVS Capital Improvement Projects Move Forward

The 2023 Nevada Legislature and the Governor approved eight Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) for projects at the SNSVH, North Las Vegas SVH, and NNSVH.

The SNSVH Capital Improvement Projects includes a remodel and addition authorization for the federal grant funding amount of \$63,957,628; remodel and addition authorization for bond funds totaling \$35,831,018; walk-in cooler and freezer replacement totaling \$503,680; and replace cooling tower piers totaling \$390,222.

North Las Vegas SVH Capital Improvement Projects includes advance planning totaling \$15,537,686.

NNSVH Capital Improvement Projects includes storage building installation totaling \$2,098,083.

Both State Veteran Memorial Cemeteries received approval for CIP projects including: the SNVMC chapel remodel totaling \$894,842; and the NNVMC committal building totaling \$3,451,011.

Nevada Veterans Transition Assistance Program (NVTAP) September Summit

NDVS hosted an NVTAP Summit which brought together 37 community partners to provide support to transitioning military members, veterans, and their families. NVTAP is a Nevada-specific program created and implemented by NDVS to provide guidance and support for military members and their families who are transitioning from the military to civilian life.

NDVS hosted the 2023 Women Veterans Conference in Las Vegas on March 10, 2023. Seating was at capacity with more than 100 participants. The event brought together women veterans, active-duty, Guard members, and Reservists. Thirty-one exhibitors participated. New Healthcare Champions Partnership

NDVS partnered with the American Heart Association to further the Veterans Healthcare Champions Program. This program is designed to identify veterans, inform them about benefits, and assist in benefit connection when applicable.

New Healthcare Champions Partnerships Involving Native American Communities 16

The NDVS Suicide Prevention Program partnered with Nevada Urban Indians and Reno-Sparks Indian Colony to establish a Suicide Prevention Coalition. Training surrounding the Veterans Health Care Pocket Card initiative was also provided to tribal staff and clinical healthcare providers in support of tribal veterans.

NDVS Governor's Challenge Suicide Prevention Team Participates in Pre-Policy Academy **17** The Pre-Policy Academy was held on March 7-8, 2023, in Carson City. It was led in coordination between the NDVS Suicide Prevention Specialist and the Nevada Office of Suicide Prevention.

Trainings Go Virtual Resulting in Record Attendance

Training sessions for specific NDVS programs went virtual instead of in-person resulting in record attendance. The virtual sessions were held for the Caregiver Program, Military Sexual Trauma Program, and support series, as well as training for Veterans Service Officers (VSO). With exception of the VSO trainings, attendees of the other sessions included healthcare professionals, survivors, advocates, as well as those interested in the topics provided.

New Suicide Prevention Partnerships with Four Tribal Communities 19

Partnerships were formed with the Reno-Sparks Indian Colony, Nevada Urban Indians, Las Vegas Indian Center, and the Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribe to provide education on suicide prevention and the resources available for tribal veterans.

New Partnership to Prevent Veteran Suicide 20

NDVS partnered with Northern Nevada Public Health to create a Lethal Means Reduction Alliance to prevent suicide.

NNSVH Hosts Marine Corps 4th LAR Battalion Reunion

The Northern Nevada State Veterans Home (NNSVH) hosted the Marine 4th LAR Battalion Reunion for a fun, outdoor social during which the NNSVH Resident Council was presented with a guidon (battalion flag) and a \$500 donation.

Expansion Completed at SNVMC

Battle Born Memorial, Nevada State Capitol Grounds, Carson City

Dedicated in 2018, on the grounds of the Capitol Complex in Carson City, this memorial serves as a place of reflection and honor to Nevadans killed in combat. There are 895 names of Nevadans on the memorial, dating back to the Civil War.

Nevada Veterans Memorial Wall, Nevada State Capitol Grounds, Carson City

The Nevada Veterans Memorial Wall is carved in cream-colored stone and is dedicated to Nevada veterans of all eras. It is situated in a plaza located directly behind the Nevada State Capitol Building.

Nevada State Veterans Memorial, Grant Sawyer Grounds, Las Vegas

The Nevada State Veterans Memorial in Las Vegas is located on the grounds of the Grant Sawyer State Office Building in Las Vegas. It features 18 larger-than-life statues depicting soldiers, sailors, airmen, and Marines and it commemorates veterans from every generation and every conflict. In partnership with the Department of Administration, an online "Memorial Buy-A-Brick" program was created to support future maintenance.

Mustang 22 Memorial, Reno Stead Airport, Stead

The Mustang 22 Memorial is located at the Army aviation support facility in Reno and is dedicated to Mustang 22, a CH-47 Chinook helicopter that was shot down in Afghanistan on September 25, 2005. NDVS supports the maintenance of these memorials. There are many other veterans memorials throughout Nevada that were created by local governments and private organizations, attesting to the respect and appreciation the people of Nevada have for our veterans.



CEREMONIES FOR UNACCOMPANIED VETERANS

Held on the days, times as follows:

SNVMC - Held weekly on Thursdays at 8:40 a.m. These ceremonies are supported by many southern Nevada veterans' organizations including the Southern Nevada Patriot Guard Riders and the Women Veterans of Nevada.

NNVMC - Held every other month beginning with January, on the fourth Thursday of the month (except in November, when it's held on the 3rd Thursday) at 9:00 a.m. during May-October and at 3:00 p.m. from November-April. These ceremonies are supported by the Nevada Veterans Coalition.

Unaccompanied ceremonies are held when family members or friends of a deceased veteran are not present. These services include a live bugle rendition of "Taps," a three-volley salute, and a flag folding ceremony.

On January 25, 2023, a Groundbreaking Ceremony was held to kick off a 35-acre expansion of the SNVMC. The expanded area opened to the public on November 30, 2023. The expansion includes four in-ground cremation sections (5,432 plots), eight columbarium walls (5,740 niches), two roundabouts, roads, and sidewalks. This expansion enables the cemetery to continue to meet demand for 8 additional years.

Veterans Service Officers (VSOs)

NDVS has been supporting veterans with claims assistance since the department was first established in 1943. Nevada-based VSOs are trained by NDVS or by their parent veterans' services organization and are accredited by the VA. Our VSOs are available – free of charge - for veterans, servicemembers, and their families to provide the following:

- · Assist with filing VA claims and appeals
- Provide connection to information or access to earned benefits, programs, resources, and services
- Support transitioning servicemembers and veterans to set them up for success

Outreach to Veterans Across Nevada

The NDVS Community Outreach Program is an important component to connecting veterans, service members, and their families to earned benefits, resources, and programs. If you attended a big community event in 2023, chances are NDVS was also attending!

Outreach includes a focus on unique veteran populations which have specific needs. These programs include the Women Veterans Program, LGBTQ Veterans Program, Native American Veterans Program, Justice Reintegration Support Program, and the Veteran Employment and Education Program

Women Veterans Program

Women remain America's fastest-growing demographic of veterans, according to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), but women warriors face significant challenges in a wide array of areas from connecting to earned benefits to gaining employment after military service to health-related issues. In response, NDVS has created initiatives and events to address the challenges facing women veterans.



Key highlights of this program:

2023 Women Veterans Conference - NDVS, in partnership with the Nevada National Guard hosted this conference in Las Vegas on March 10, 2023. The seating was at capacity with approximately 300 participants.

- The theme "Celebrating Women Who Tell Our Stories" included keynote speakers, retired Colonel Katherine "Kat" Miller, CMS Tabitha Gavia, and Palms Casino CEO Cynthia Kiser-Murphy.
- The next conference is set for March 9, 2024.

Lesbian, Gay, Bi, Trans, Queer (LGBTQ+) Veterans Program

Raising awareness and education for LGBTQ+ veterans is important because previously ineligible veterans may become eligible to obtain benefits such as:

• GI Bill

- VA Medical Care
- VA Home Loan Program
- VA Burial Benefits



Key highlights of this program:

The LGBTQ+ Veterans Service Officer became a full-time position in 2023 following approval during the 82nd Session of the Nevada Legislature. This Veterans Service Officer joined NDVS in the Fall of 2023 and has been raising awareness, providing education as well as connecting veterans to earned benefits, resources, and services and discharge upgrades.

Native American Veterans Program

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs notes, per capita, Native Americans consistently maintain the highest rates of enlistment in the U.S. Armed Force, however, they continue to rank near the bottom in accessing earned benefits. Because of this, outreach to Nevada's Native American veterans remains a priority.

Key highlights of this program:

PACT Act and Toxic Exposure Awareness - NDVS partnered with Nevada Urban Indians and Reno Sparks Indian Colony to provide continuing education related to the Veterans Health Care Pocket Card initiative. The card provides information on available resources and also raises awareness about the unique healthcare needs of veterans who may have certain disabilities, diseases, and conditions that are directly related to their military service. Suicide Prevention - Partnerships were formed with four Tribal Communities. Each coalition consists of individuals to create a strategic plan for suicide prevention training and resources to prevent suicide among the tribal veterans' communities.

Additionally, NDVS social media platforms continue to recognize and honor Native American veterans throughout the year to raise awareness and provide education about military accomplishments, significant anniversaries, or events.

KEY VETERAN OUTREACH, PROGRAMS, & INITIATIVES

Justice Reintegration Support Program

Collaboration continues with the Veterans Treatment Court programs (VTC), Nevada Department of Corrections (NDOC) and community partners to ensure veterans reintegrating into society have the best opportunity to succeed and reduce recidivism.

NDVS is part of a collaboration facilitated by NDOC to offer all inmates re-entry programs including educational and vocational opportunities. Incarcerated veterans and graduates of VTC also receive assistance from NDVS on the following:

- Requests to procure their DD214.
- Apply for a discharge upgrade (if eligible) .
- Connection with a VSO.
- Connect to veterans service organizations and housing assistance through the VA, upon release.



Key highlights of this program:

NDVS staff continued participating in graduation ceremonies for Nevada's Veterans Treatment Courts to ensure graduates know how to access information or connect to earned benefits. Nevada's Veterans' Treatment Court is a specialty court that offers treatment rather than time behind bars for veterans accused of non-violent crimes. Veterans receive counseling, mental health treatment as well as recovery support for substance abuse. The program is voluntary and takes participants anywhere from 12 to 24 months to complete.

It provides information to transitioning service members, veterans, and their families to support success following U.S. military service back into civilian life. NVTAP also provides Nevada-specific information on the resources, services, and programs available to those who plan to call Nevada "home."

Key highlights of this program include:

- NVTAP event held on February 12, 2023, at the Fallon Convention Center resulting in a 12% increase in community partner engagement.
- Additional resources were added to the NVTAP website to assist transitioning veterans to connect with their earned education benefits and employment opportunities.

Welcome Home Program

In addition to NVTAP, when a service member decides to leave the U.S. Armed Forces, either through the expiration of their term of service or through retirement, they are asked where they intend to reside in their new civilian life. When the answer is Nevada, the VAST Team reaches out to welcome and connect them to important State and federal resources.



Key highlights of the program:

In 2023, the team sent 1,937 "Welcome Home" letters and packets with approximately 24% sent to women veterans.

Engaging Communities - Nevada Veterans Advocate Program

Nevada Veterans Advocates (NV Advocate) are trained volunteers who support our VSOs. This program is recognized by the VA as a national best practice that effectively connects veterans and their families to earned benefits. Free online and in-person NV Advocate training is provided by NDVS.

The 20-module NV Advocate course provides:

- ★ Training on State and Federal VA benefits and services available to Nevada's active-duty military, veterans, and their families
- ★ Online and in-person training options



Key highlights of this program:

NV Advocate Program Reaches Major Milestone - This program certified its 1,000th trained volunteer in August 2023! Congratulations to Carlos Cisneros who became the 1,000th Nevadan to undergo the NV Advocate course and receive his certificate. As of December 31, 2023, there are 1,072 certified NV Advocates.

NV Advocate Conferences in Reno and Las Vegas - NDVS hosted free two-day workshops to set participants on the path to becoming an NV Advocate. The first conference was held in Reno on April 15-16, 2023, at the Reno-Sparks Convention and Visitors Center resulting in 48 attendees and 7 exhibitors. Another NV Advocate Conference was held on October 7, 2023, at the Culinary Academy of Las Vegas resulting in 44 attendees and 9 exhibitors. These trained NV Advocate volunteers help connect veterans and military members to earned benefits, resources, and programs.

Some NVA volunteers also assist in outreach at community events across Nevada.

SNSVH Celebrates 21st Anniversary

In August 2002, SNSVH opened its doors. In the year 2023, the facility marked its 21st Anniversary with a special celebration held on August 22, 2023, with a joint mixer involving the Boulder City Chamber of Commerce.

PFC David "Nick" Crombie Certified Nursing Assistant Training Academy

The Crombie Academy is housed within SNSVH and was established in 2021. The workforce development program provides both training and CNA job opportunities at SNSVH, at no cost to participants.

The program provides:

- Introduction to basic nursing skills, nursing assistant duties, and responsibilities.
- Understanding of veteran culture in an acute and long-term care setting.
- Four-weeks (120 hours total) of training (30 hours per week), which includes 40 hours of classroom instruction, 40 hours of laboratory practice, and 40 hours of supervised clinical instruction.
- Prepares graduates for the CNA State Board of Nursing Examination.
- Provides front-line CNA job opportunities at SNSVH for students who pass the exam.
- Consists of a maximum of 15 students per class.
- Preference given to Gold Star Families, veterans, spouses of veterans, families of SNSVH team members, and Boulder City residents.

On February 2, 2023, a pinning ceremony was held for six Crombie Academy students who completed the program and graduated. Graduates who go on to pass the State of Nevada's CNA Certification Exam are eligible for CNA job opportunities at the SNSVH.

NORTHERN NEVADA STATE VETERANS HOME

The Northern Nevada State Veterans Home (NNSVH) in Sparks opened in late 2019. It is uniquely designed to provide residents with the experience of a high-end resort that offers superior skilled nursing care and rehabilitation services.

NNSVH offers a host of amenities including:

- Private room, bathroom, and shower
- Shared den, living room, kitchen with up to 16 residents to encourage socialization
- Private front door entry to each household of eight residents

NNSVH is state-owned, operated by Avalon Healthcare Group, and accepts Medicare/Medicaid, VA per diem, and private pay, making the home more affordable than other comparable nursing homes for most veterans.

KEY VETERAN HEALTHCARE PROGRAMS & INITIATIVES

Veteran Health and Wellness Programs

The Healthcare Services Division oversees several programs and initiatives aimed at addressing specific healthcare needs of veterans, military members, and their families.

Healthcare Champions Program (Exposure Risk Education)

This program consists of three main elements:

- **Outreach** to Nevada's healthcare professionals to inform and raise awareness about the unique needs of veterans' care as veterans may be been exposed to certain hazards making them more at risk for certain illnesses or diseases.
- **Education** to ensure veterans and their healthcare providers understand the importance of connecting with a Veterans Service Officer surrounding exposure risk, presumptive conditions, or illnesses for claims and other assistance.
- Data collection through the Exposure Risk Questionnaire which is conducted in partnership with the Nevada Department of Health and Humans Services (DHHS). Take the Exposure Risk Questionnaire on the NDVS website at: https://veterans.nv.gov/exposure-risk-questionnaire



Key Highlights of this program:

The Healthcare Initiative Specialist became a full-time position in 2023 following approval during the 82nd Session of the Nevada Legislature. This specialist joined NDVS in the Fall of 2023 and has been conducting outreach to raise awareness, provide education as well as connect veterans to earned benefits, resources, services, and discharge upgrades.

A new partnership was formed between NDVS and the American Heart Association to further the Veterans Healthcare Champions Program. This program includes an educational and resource guide, "Veterans Health Care Pocket Card," to be provided to care providers outside the VA. After receiving language and other updates, the card underwent a second round of printing for continued distribution.

New partnerships were formed between NDVS, Nevada Urban Indians, and the Reno Sparks Indian Colony for continued education related to the distribution of the Veterans Health Care Pocket Card (Exposure Risk Education). The goal of providing education about presumptive conditions, local resources, and federal benefits is to increase the quality of life for Native American veterans in Nevada.

Using data compiled from the Exposure Risk Questionnaire, DHHS releases the Veterans Health Survey1 to inform Nevadans on the current health risks and needs of veterans. In the most recent report under NRS 417.126, the following information on military health risks revealed:

- The NDVS website remained the number one source for Nevada veterans to learn about exposure risks and to take the Exposure Risk Questionnaire.
- The majority of Nevada's veterans taking the questionnaire served in the U.S. Army.
- The majority of respondents said they served during a wartime era, with most serving during the Vietnam War.
- The majority of veterans taking the questionnaire received a service-disability rating from the VA.
- The Top 10 service-connected conditions identified by survey participants were sleep disturbances, anxiety, joint pain, prostate cancer, heart disease, irritable bowel syndrome, lung cancer, diabetes, gastrointestinal symptoms, and kidney cancer.
- The majority of surveyed veterans are receiving health care or benefits from the VA.

VETERANS IN CARE PROGRAM

The Veterans in Care Program (VIC) enhances the quality-of-life for Nevada's veterans living in community-based care settings in addition to those living in our Nevada State Veterans' Homes.

VIC has three specific elements:

- Connection to Benefits and Services by offering immediate access to a Veterans Service Officer for benefits counseling and claims services which may result in financial benefits.
- **Provides Quality-of-Life Recognition Ceremonies** to honor and recognize these veterans, letting them know their service and sacrifice will always be remembered.
- Offers Military Culture Education Training by providing training resources for facility staff to enhance understanding of how military experience affects aging veterans, especially those with cognitive impairments.



Key highlights of the program:

In 2023, NDVS hosted 5 VIC ceremonies with approximately 265 veterans being recognized and given the opportunity to connect with a VSO. For more information or to schedule a VIC ceremony, contact pio.ndvs@veterans.nv.gov.

VETERAN HEALTHCARE PROGRAMS & INITIATIVES

Bravo-Zulu Military Culture Training for Healthcare Providers

The official title of this specialized training is "Bravo-Zulu: Achieving Excellence in Relationship Centered Care," but it is referred to as Bravo-Zulu or BZ training. This program was developed in 2017 in partnership with the Perry Foundation and the Nevada Geriatric Education Center. BZ training is offered to community-based healthcare providers including licensed administrators, nurses, and social workers. Training benefits include:

- Supports the understanding of how military service may impact aging and care.
- Provides knowledge on military culture and its significance in providing care.
- Offers continuing education units (CEUs) from the Nevada State Board of Nursing, Board of Examiners for Long-Term Care, and Board of Social Workers.

Military Sexual Trauma Program

The Department of Defense defines Military Sexual Trauma (MST) as rape, sexual assault, and sexual harassment leading some survivors to deal with debilitating conditions including Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and major depression. In 2016, NDVS created an MST Program to help address the impacts of MST. The MST Program consists of three components:

- Providing information to health care providers who might treat veterans with MST.
- Providing information to veterans suffering from MST.
- · Assisting MST survivors in obtaining VA disability benefits for the enduring mental health effects of MST.

Key highlights of this program:

NDVS hosted a six-part education series in partnership with the Perry Foundation. The highly attended series kicked off on January 24, 2023, focusing on suicide prevention. The focus shifted specifically to MST on February 23, March 30, and April 20, 2023. These sessions provided training to health care providers and survivors, with high attendance. NDVS partners with the Perry Foundation offering half-day workshops two times a year. Look for MST workshops to continue in 2023.

Parkinson Disease Support & Education Program

Since Parkinson Disease has been added to the list of presumptive conditions for Agent Orange, NDVS continues to partner with organizations that provide awareness, education, and support surrounding this illness. In 2023, NDVS continued its partnership with the Perry Foundation to offer education to health care providers. NDVS also formed partnerships with the Desert Southwest Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association and the Parkinson Support Center of Northern Nevada to further connections for veterans and their families living with Parkinsons Disease.

Caregiver Support Program


NDVS routinely provides veterans and caregivers of veterans with information about resources, programs, events, training opportunities as well as other helpful information such as community partners and organizations to support them. In the second quarter of SFY23, the Healthcare Program Manager attended a statewide Strategic Planning Session for the Nevada Lifespan Respite Care Coalition which identified key initiatives for the coalition through 2023. NDVS advocated for caregivers of veterans and veterans living with a disability highlighting how the VA, community partners, and the coalition can work together to close respite care gaps in Nevada.

Suicide Prevention Program

The Suicide Prevention Program works directly with Nevada's veterans, active, guard, and reserve service members as well as families, caregivers, survivors, and community stakeholders to connect individuals with suicide prevention initiatives, resources, and direct services.

NDVS Role in Suicide Prevention Includes:

- Developing and implementing suicide prevention strategies to identify service members, veterans, and their families who may be at risk and to promote connectedness.
- Increasing lethal means safety throughout Nevada.
- Partnering with community stakeholders to educate, inform, and communicate on veteran-specific, suicide risk and protective factors in support of a holistic approach to ending veteran suicide.



Key highlights of the program:

NDVS hosted a Suicide Prevention Educational Session, in partnership by the Perry Foundation, on January 24, 2023. The virtual session was targeted at health care professionals. It provided CEU's for long-term care administrators, social workers, and nurses.

NDVS formed a partnership with the Nevada Urban Indians and the Reno-Sparks Indian Colony to focus on lethal means safety and suicide prevention training for tribal health care providers, service members, veterans, and their families.

NDVS partnered with Western Nevada Community College, Great Basin University, Truckee Meadows Community College, University of Nevada in Reno, and Veterans Upward Bound at Truckee Meadows Community College to implement connectedness programs for younger veterans.

Governor's and Mayor's Challenge Programs

NDVS serves as the lead for the Governor's Challenge Team and the liaison to the Mayors' Challenge Teams. The programs were designed by our federal partners, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). Other federal partners include the U.S. Department of Defense and U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Program Summary:

- Develop and implement suicide prevention strategies to identify service members, veterans, and their families who may be at risk and to promote connectedness.
- Bring together leaders from government agencies, active guard, and reserve military organizations, healthcare organizations, businesses, nonprofits, veterans' organizations, clergy, and others to end veteran suicide.
- Help leaders in communities and governmental agencies to work together to prevent suicide.
- Develop and work with interagency military and civilian leadership groups to better understand the issue and work together to develop strategic plans for implementing at the local level.

NDVS has recruited more communities than any other state in the nation to become involved in the Mayor's Challenge which now includes partnerships in Las Vegas, Truckee Meadows, Elko, Mesquite, and Winnemucca.





GRANT AWARDS HELPING VETERANS

Rural Transportation

Rural Transportation grants are offered through the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and Veterans Health Administration. The Highly Rural Transportation Grants (HRTG) offer free transportation to VA and non-VA health care providers and facilities in specific rural areas to eligible veterans.

- NDVS applied for and was awarded \$100,000 in SFY23.
- Funds were divided equally between the Elko County Transit District and the Nye Communities Coalition.

Expansion at Southern Nevada Veterans Memorial Cemetery (SNVMC)

In 2023, NDVS received grant funding of up to \$5,268,723 in Federal VA funds for expansion and other projects at the SNVMC. The project was completed in November 2023. The expansion included four in-ground cremation sections (5,432 plots), eight columbarium walls (5,740 niches), two roundabouts, roads, and sidewalks. This expansion enables the cemetery to continue to meet demand for 8 additional years.

Expansion at Northern Nevada Veterans Memorial Cemetery (NNVMC)

In 2023, NDVS received a grant funding award of \$5,182,845 in Federal VA funding for expansion and other projects at the NNVMC. The project was completed in August 2023. The funding added 3,580 wall niche sites, 806 double casket sites, and 757 in ground cremation sites. This expansion enables the cemetery to continue to meet demand for an additional 11 years.

Additionally, the State set aside \$297,774 to renovate the cemetery's main pavilion structure. The pavilion provides shelter for cemetery ceremonies. In 2023, construction on the pavilion renovation got underway.

GRANT AWARDS HELPING VETERANS

Information Technology Operations

Information Technology (IT) Operations plays an important role in overseeing and supporting the wide-ranging technological needs of the department.

2023 ACCOMPLISHMENT HIGHLIGHTS INCLUDE:

Veteran Information System (VIS) Scanning Project

In February, the VIS team completed scanning paper DD214s to convert the documents stored in the State of Nevada system into electronic copies. Since the project started, 94,259 have been scanned!

The second phase of this project is now underway. Approximately 36,000 paper DD214s that were generated by the VAST team are being scanned. So far, of those documents, 14,498 have been scanned.

The Nevada National Guard (Air Force and Army) has agreed to allow the VIS team to scan and upload the NGB 22 Forms. There are 559 boxes of forms located at the Nevada State Archive alone. It is estimated it will take 10 years to complete this project.



"Find Your Loved One" (FYLO) Grave Locator GPS/GIS Mapping Project

This project at the Northern and Southern Nevada Veterans Memorial Cemeteries will enable visitors to locate loved ones using a cell phone. Phase 1 of this project is complete. It is anticipated Phase 2 will launch in 2024.



Technology Upgrades

New, advanced phone systems were installed at the State Veterans Homes and Memorial Cemeteries allowing for better video conferencing and other features.

There are three legislative events hosted by NDVS in partnership with the United Veterans Legislative Council (UVLC). The events are the Veterans Legislative Symposia, Veterans Legislative Summits and Veterans and Military Day at the Legislature (VAMDAL). NDVS also partners with the Nevada National Guard for VAMDAL.

United Veterans Legislative Council (UVLC)

The UVLC is a nonpartisan, politically neutral organization that serves as a "voice" for veterans, military members, and their families. Every veterans' organization in Nevada is represented. Leadership is elected among UVLC members every two years. Currently, U.S. Army veteran Andy LePeilbet is serving as the Chairman.

The UVLC supports several roles:

- Serves as the lobbying arm for Nevada's veterans
- Ensures the veterans' community speaks with one, unified voice
- Engages, educates, and informs veterans about the legislative process
- Gathers Nevada veterans together to identify and prioritize issues for legislative consideration

There is no cost for membership.

Nevada Veterans Legislative Symposia and Summit

The symposia and summit provide a process for the Nevada veterans' community to learn about and engage in Nevada's legislative process as well as identify and prioritize legislative concerns. Both the symposia and summit are held in partnership with the UVLC.

The Nevada Veterans Legislative Summit is held during the years the Nevada Legislature is in session. The most recent summit was held in Las Vegas on January 14, 2023, with 67 attendees and in Reno on January 21, 2023, with 78 attendees.

82nd Legislative Session Bill Overview

There were 29 bill draft requests (BDRs) supporting veterans, military, and their families that were assigned a bill. Of those, 18 important veterans' bills were signed into law by Governor Lombardo and one Senate Joint Resolution was enrolled and sent to the Secretary of State, comprising 66 percent of bills considered favorably. 10 bills failed by the Legislative deadline. Four of the five state-wide themes identified in the 2022 Legislative Symposia were addressed through 18 bills that the Governor signed, or through the passage of Governor Lombardo's SFY 24-25 Budget as shown below.

Additionally, funding was approved in the Governor's CIP Budget to remodel the Southern Nevada State Veterans Home, for planning the North Las Vegas State Veterans Home, and for other projects. Based on the Governor's budget requests, the Legislature approved two full-time grounds maintenance workers, two full-time Veteran Service Officers, Suicide Prevention Specialist, Healthcare Initiative Specialist, Education & Employment Officer, and a Northern Outreach Officer. The Governor's recommended budget was also approved with funding for the Adopt a Vet Dental Program, the number one priority identified in the March 2022, Nevada Veterans Legislative Symposia.

Require service providers to implement the, "Ask the Question" Program: No BDRs.

Honor and recognize veterans' service by reducing certain state fees, offering veterans preferences, and providing medical time off for veterans employed by the State of Nevada: AB 203, AB 260, AB 279, AB 295, AB 306, SB 50, SB 374.

★ THEME 4:

Improve occupational licensure for veterans and military spouses: AB 158, SB 97, SB 175, SB 270, SB 399, SB 442

★ THEME 5:

Improve programing for veterans in/transitioning from justice system: AB 35.




