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2024 Veterans Legislative Symposia Report June 28, 2024

1. Purpose: This report presents recommendations gathered from Nevada's Veterans Community for consideration by the Governor and by Nevada State Legislature.

2. Background

- a. The Nevada Department of Veterans Services (NDVS) partnered with Nevada's United Veterans Legislative Council (UVLC) to host a Veterans Legislative Symposia in March and early April of 2024.
 - (1) 67 participants representing 16 different veterans' organizations attended the 23 March 2024 Reno Symposium.
 - (2) 61 participants representing 16 different veterans' organizations attended the 6 April 2024 Las Vegas Symposium.
- b. The purpose of Nevada's Veterans Legislative Symposia is to bring together representatives from the Nevada veteran's community to develop legislative recommendations for the upcoming legislative session. The results of these symposia are compiled into a report and presented to the Governor and to members of the Nevada Legislature, as well as our veterans and their families.
- c. While the purpose of the Symposia is to identify issues that might be addressed by the State of Nevada Legislature, issues are often raised that can be addressed by the Governor or by State of Nevada Agencies. These issues are referred to the appropriate State authority. Additionally, any Federal issues raised by participants are presented to members of Nevada's Senators & Congressional delegation for their review and consideration.
- d. The symposia both started with opening remarks by NDVS Director Mary Devine and Deputy Director of Benefits Lisa Maciel, who explained the symposia's purpose and agendas. In Reno, participants also heard Senator Lisa Krasner, and State Assemblymembers Angie Taylor, Phillip K. "PK" O'Neil, and Ken Gray. Las Vegas participants heard from Assemblymembers Brittney Miller, Claire Thomas, Shondra Summers-Armstrong, and Reuben D'Silva. The participating state legislators

provided invaluable insight regarding how veterans could effectively participate during the upcoming session. Additionally, Las Vegas attendees were introduced to Congressional Representatives Eric Cardona, Daniel Carranza, and Alanna Simpson.

- e. The opening portion of both symposia concluded with remarks by ULVC Chairman Andy LePeilbet, who invited the audience to consider participation in the UVLC, and how the impact of joint action can positively impact legislative outcomes.
- f. Following the opening sessions, the floor was opened to veterans to present their individual or organizational issues or concerns. In advance of the Symposia, recommendations were gathered from the Interagency Council on Veterans Affairs (ICVA), the Nevada Veterans Services Commission (VSC), and the Women Veterans Advisory Committee (WVAC) for consideration at the symposia. During the symposia, additional recommendations were made by participants. All these recommendations were prioritized by attendees; each attendee was given 15 stickers to vote with, allowing the ability to vote on a wider variety of issues.

3. 2024 Veterans Legislative Symposia Outcomes:

- a. In total, 85 combined federal and state issues were identified and prioritized across both symposia; some issues were identical between the Reno and Las Vegas events.
- b. 69 state issues were identified and prioritized across both symposia. (Enclosure A)
- c. 42 federal issues were identified and prioritized and will be referred to Nevada's Federal Delegation for consideration. (Enclosure B)
- d. There were several common themes that emerged from the recommendations. These themes, in priority order, are as follows:

THEME 1: Improve outreach to veterans, military service members, their families, and external stakeholders across the state of Nevada to increase awareness of benefits and resources (healthcare & mental health for example) available with special attention to Nevada's underserved populations (homeless, justice involved veterans, women, LGTBT+, rural, etc.); "Ask the Question". Educate communities & enforce regulations on unaccredited/for-fee claims assistance. Create community groups/coalition for homeless veterans; increase stand-downs across the state.

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THEME 2: Additional State of Nevada benefits including exemption from real property and DMV taxes, state tax holidays for National Guard members, add free airport parking for veterans regarding disability rating without a logo on a plate, and provide additional accommodations/access on public lands. Hire additional Veterans Service Officers for claims/benefit assistance across the state. Implement rent control for military/service-connected veterans.

THEME 3: Expansion of VA Healthcare in rural Nevada, recognition of hyperbaric treatment at the VA, additional research/therapies for mental health treatment, heated aqua pools at VA medical facilities for physical therapy, dental extractions for necessary implants, and increase in clothing allowance from the VA to allow for seasonal changes with the use of prosthetics. Establish veteran adult day health facilities, establish additional veteran long term-care facilities with priority in northeastern Nevada. Expansion of programs for MST/mental healthcare. Expand rights for women veterans with military sexual trauma and provide additional resources for suicide prevention.

THEME 4: Expansion of education benefits for veterans with service-connected disabilities, children/survivors of service-connected veterans, National Guard/reserve members.

THEME 5: Improve veteran, service member, and spouse related hiring practices to ensure sustainability of the workforce, including accessibility to licensure and reciprocity for existing licenses. Reduce barriers for veterans trying to start and run their own businesses, such as licensing, funding, availability of education, and availability of meaningful contracts, complete comprehensive studies on contract disparities.

THEME 6: Expand pension eligibility, removing the "1-day" war-time era requirements, increase federal benefits for national guard & dependents, reduce timeline for VA claims processing, provide additional accommodations/access on public lands, and provide retroactive payments for MH/MST. Implement/expand programs to eliminate eviction/foreclosure before being forced into homeless shelters.

Theme 7: Increase recognition of Nevada veterans & families by recognizing Gold Star family members, continued support of "Missing in Nevada" missions, and establishment of Veterans/Military Museum in Nevada. Recognize Women's Military History Month annually/permanently in March of each year in Nevada.

Theme 8: Improve the road conditions for access to the Northern Nevada Veterans Cemetery, add a weekend burial option, and eliminate fees for spouses of veterans.

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Finally, some of the issues raised by participants did not have broad support by participants, but they might be representative of issues or concerns of veterans not present; so, while they may not be statistically relevant, they are worth reviewing.
